PASTOR JACK'S COLUMN

Tithes and Offerings

The New Testament nowhere commands, or requires, that Christians submit to a legalistic tithe system like that of Moses day in Old Testament Leviticus 27:30. At that time, Moses was simply instructed to teach the Israelite's how to live in a way that honored the God who had brought them out of bondage in Egypt.

Fast forward 1300 years, and 46 books of our Bible, where the Apostle Paul instructed the church in Corinth how to support his ministry of spreading the good news of Jesus Christ, the risen Savior. He wrote, "On the first day of every week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with your income, saving it up, so that when I come no collections will have to be made." (1 Corinthians 16) It was a reminder that his work was important, required financial backing for sustainability, and was worthy of continual support whether he was present or not.

Church work and missions continue today. They're still worthy, and they still require money to sustain them. Paul suggested no obligatory, set amount; just the instruction of "keeping with your income." This should encourage us to ask ourselves about our own giving habits. An offering is something freely given by Christians to the work of the Lord, the local church, and ministries or mis-



sions. Of course, offering is not just money, but our whole selves as well. We've learned through our study on the Sermon on the Mount; God is not nearly as interested in our monetary offerings as He is in our submission and obedience to Him. The truth is: All we have was first given to us, to use for His glory; storing up treasures in Heaven.

In this issue of *The Journey* I've asked Joanne to provide instruction for enrolling in the Simply Giving program. I encourage you to consider it. Simply Giving takes the worry out of remembering to give back in support of God's work. Cheryl and I signed up for weekly offering soon after my arrival in February. In deciding the amount, I sought the guidance of God's first church planter, Paul. Found in 2 Corinthians 9:6-7, The Message version sums up his words well:

"Remember: A stingy planter gets a stingy crop; a lavish planter gets a lavish crop. I want each of you to take plenty of time to think it over and make up your own mind what you will give. That will protect you against sob stories and arm-twisting. God loves it when the giver delights in the giving."

May God continue to bless you and guide you. He wants to use you. Let Him!


The children of Haiti are born into the third poorest country in the world. Many children live in poorly-made houses with dirty floors, no electricity, no bathroom, and go to bed





- The children's blue cloth Busy Bags have been washed, replenished with books, toys, and snacks, and new bags will be made.



THE DRIFTWOOD CROSS

EDITOR'S NOTE: You've seen it displayed in the Sanctuary at different times during the church year, and perhaps thought it was just an interesting version of the cross. But you might not have known the story of the creator of the Driftwood Cross, which is now displayed in the Narthex. It was crafted by Trinity member Tim Hayes (Bob & Karen Hayes' and Donna Soper's nephew), who died in December 2004. For those who knew him or even those who just know his story, the cross is a visible reminder of the strength of Tim's faith in God. Karen shares her memories of Tim below.

In case you were wondering, Tim did write his own obituary. He had plenty of time to think it out and write. Maybe that is why I'm struggling to write down my words about him. There is so much to Tim than what he wrote.

I met Tim in 1974-75, when he was a youngster of 12 or 13 years. I was new to the Hayes family and had only heard tales of Tim, his brothers and his legendary dad, Gordy. Every story I heard included laughter, high jinx, pranks and great adventures. Being a bit naive I was never quite sure if the stories were the truth or if they had been exaggerated over the years. I know now that some were the truth and some were exaggerated. To me they were a blended family of five high-spirited boys who had a dad who understood them enough to let them be just that.

Tim graduated high school in Hudson, WI. A few years later his dad and stepmom purchased the Chit Chat Bar and Grill in Edgewater, and the family moved from Hudson to Edgewater.

The first time I remember Tim's health to be in question was a few years after Tim and Scott bought Chit Chat following their dad's tragic death in a car accident. Tim was having some problems with a sore throat. He had had dental work done and thought it was the cause of the sore throat. He went to the dentist who then sent him to an oral surgeon. The oral surgeon sent him to an



ENT doctor. He was the one who did the biopsy that confirmed that it was indeed throat cancer. It was 1993, and Tim was a young 31-year old.

The next memory of Tim was when he had his first surgery. Bob was working in La Mar, Colorado and I was with him. Many frantic phone calls went on between Colorado and Birchwood. I remember the feeling of hopelessness at being so far from home and family. The only answer was prayers and lots of them. It was hard to believe the story of what the surgeon had to do to rid the cancer from Tim's body. He had to basically reconstruct a throat for Tim. It was hard to listen to our own two sons who had visited Tim in the hospital after his surgery. Everybody loved Tim and they were no exception.

The only thing to cling onto was prayer and faith. At one time there were many prayers being lifted up on Tim's behalf from Trinity's members. There were easels set up in the narthex of Trinity where people could sign up for 15 minutes of prayer for him. Continuous prayers around the clock! I also remember several members of Trinity who drove Tim to his chemo treatments in Eau Claire.


His surgery contained the cancer but there was more to his recovery. He had several rounds of chemo which proved to be the challenge. The two fears that Tim had were losing his ability to speak and being unable to eat food. Most of the time he did have a feeding tube. His voice returned. Once it returned he couldn't stop talking. He wanted to make sure his young family and friends knew how he felt about them.

Doctors told Tim and Kim they would be unable to have any more children as a result of the chemo. God showed the doctors what control he has over things and Kim became pregnant with their child Nathan, the miracle gift from God!

After Nathan's birth, scar tissue in Tim's throat became the new problem. Tim had more life to live and more kids to tickle. Tim and Kim realized that a new treatment plan was needed. They went to Mayo in Rochester to find answers. I still remember him saying he went into the doctor's office with his Bible and pictures of each of his kids. He slammed the Bible down and told the doctor these were his kids and he needed to live

for them. And with God's help he was confident it could be done! What faith he had!

Tim and Kim had decided to have a Plan B when it came to a future way of supporting their family. This is how the Birchwood Motel came to be. When first built, Tim's mom Marilyn would be running it. There was a small living area for her.



The motel became too much for his mom to handle because of her own health issues. Deciding the bar business wasn't doing his own health any good, it was time to run the motel. An addition to the living quarters made room for their expanding family which now included stepson Steven, Mitchell, and brand new baby girl, Morgan.

One time at the motel Tim and Kim were in the basement wrapping Christmas gifts since the kids were asleep. While in the basement the doorbell for the motel kept ringing. Puzzled because it was so late, Tim nonetheless went upstairs only to find no one there. The next time the doorbell rang Tim again went upstairs to try and see if someone might be trying to check in to the motel. Once again no one was there. When he came back into the house he heard the crackling sound and felt the heat coming through the ceiling above. Tim yelled at Kim to get the kids out while Tim called the fire department. Within minutes they living quarters were fully involved. They lost all their things and the motel suffered light smoke damage in the first two units of the motel. Tim was convinced that God had sent angels to warn him. Even the fire wasn't enough to make Tim give up. The living quarters were rebuilt along with adding a second story to the motel.

Tim was once hit by lightning while playing golf with friends. There was no reason why he survived except that God had other plans for him. Tim felt God wouldn't have saved him from that death only to let him die of cancer and leave his young family alone. It wasn't God's plan to save Tim from the cancer. Instead He gave Tim 11 years to add to the lives of those who knew him. To know Tim was our privilege and his faith gave us strength to try to carry on without him.



After talking to doctors and before his treatment began at Rochester, we received a call from Tim. On their way home Tim and Kim had stopped at a seafood market and bought a variety of items. Tim asked if Bob and I would come to their house and enjoy their feast with them. He told us if he wouldn't be able to eat food again he was going to eat everything he loved while he could.



It was his goal to show as much of God's wonder and beauty to his kids as possible. Every trip became an adventure. The cross that now hangs in the narthex was made by Tim with driftwood that was collected while on their many camping trips around Lake Superior and the Apostle Islands. Tim was very creative and good with his hands.

Talking did finally become difficult and frustrating to Tim. At one point he began writing one-page letters to people that he wanted delivered to them after his death. There was a basket full of them and if I was to venture a guess I would say there

were at least 100 of them. His uncle Bobby received one of those letters Tim simply thanked him for his service in Vietnam.

In 2003, one year before his death he started a letter with "My time is done. I now have passed. I'm in heaven free at last. We watch you now from up above." I'm not sure if it was an original quote or not. He continued his letter with "I was not afraid to die. I turned to prayer and found courage from God. I truly felt Him with me and it gave me comfort and peace. He will also be with you if you just keep your faith. I hope to see you again. Love, Tim"

His last months weren't good ones. His pain was intolerable. He wanted to die at home with his family and close friends near. The pain became so unbearable he requested Hospice to give him the drugs that would keep him in a comatose state - a practice that isn't usually done. Even the drugs were no match for Tim and couldn't keep him down. Just ask the Hospice worker who witnessed him "waking up" and grabbing her arm.

Why did God keep him going? I feel that Tim was here according to God's plan to be a lesson to all who knew him. Tim shared his love of God and lived by example what we are taught to do by Jesus.


