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PASTOR JON'S COLUMN - Good Friday Sermessage - "I Will Never Stop Loving You!"

It was the beginning of Passover Week – the Passover, the most important time in the Jewish religious calendar, a time when all good Jews tried to make the pilgrimage to Jerusalem. A Roman governor once estimated that more than two million came to the Holy City to sacrifice lambs as a thanksgiving to God for their freedom from slavery in Egypt. Jerusalem was under Roman occupation, and so Passover was also a time of tension with religious and national feelings running high. And it was this moment that Jesus chose to declare himself to the world as the Son of God. He rode into Jerusalem on a donkey, with the crowd hailing him as their long-awaited king. They shouted "blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord" – the expression "he who comes" is another way of saying "Messiah."

For 1,000 years the Jews had looked for the "golden age," a time when they would conquer all the nations and become masters of the world. They believed that God would help this to happen by sending a Messiah, a new king who would lead them to victory on the battlefield. As Jesus rode into Jerusalem the crowd spread palm branches as a royal welcome, and shouted "blessed is the coming




kingdom of our father David." The long-awaited descendant of King David had come in triumph, God's campaign of military conquest was about to begin. At last, here was the call to arms. But in all their excitement, there was something the crowd didn't seem to have noticed. Jesus was riding a donkey.

In those days, when a king went to war, he rode a horse as a sign of power. But when he went among his own people, he rode on a donkey as a sign that he'd come in peace.

This Messiah, this descendant of King David, hadn't come to them in triumph with a call to arms. The Son of God had come in peace to bring the truth to people – the truth about the real nature of his Father. And as Isaiah and others had prophesied, he hadn't come as a

king but as a servant – a servant who was to suffer and die to save his people. At Passover, a time when thousands of lambs would be sacrificed, the king had come to give himself as a final sacrifice for the sins of mankind. It was to be a sacrifice not made by priests on a Temple altar, but by Roman soldiers on a cross.



It's a dangerous thing to tell excited and emotional people that their long-held and cherished ideas are all wrong (ever try to institute a small change at your church?) When the crowd realized later that week that Jesus had come to tell them just that they turned against him. In their bitter disappointment, the cries of 'blessed is he who comes' and 'hosanna' turned into ugly shouts of 'crucify him'.

There has been much debate over the centuries about who was to blame for what happened on Good Friday. The crowd? I'm not sure we should blame the crowd; I suspect that we might not have reacted very differently to them under the circumstances. The religious establishment? They had a duty to maintain law and order, and here was a troublemaker. Some years before, after a major anti-Roman riot at a Passover, the Romans had crucified hundreds of Jews as a deterrent against it happening again. Surely it was better to let one man die so that the Jewish people could live in peace, and go on making

their sacrifices in the Temple? Yet the irony was that God had told his people, through the Old Testament prophets, that he didn't *want* all those Temple sacrifices; he told them that he just wanted people to love and obey him. The tragedy was that they didn't listen.

Perhaps God does move in mysterious ways, because, about 40 years later, when the Jewish people did finally revolt against Roman rule, the Roman army completely destroyed the Temple in Jerusalem – and the Jews never rebuilt it. And with the end of the Temple came the end of animal sacrifices. God had given the world the ultimate demonstration of his unchanging, limitless love for mankind with the sacrifice of his own Son on a Roman cross, and by his glorious victory over death three days later.

In the events of the passion we can see the real truth about our God. He is a God who says "you can revile me, mock me, kill me on a cross, but whatever you do to me, *I will never stop loving you.*" This is the loving God he's always been. The merciful God he is today. And the compassionate God he always will be. *May you know this very day... God loves you, always has – always will – PERIOD!*



FIRST COMMUNION CLASS — MARCH 12



GOOD NEWS FOR "EASTER" PEOPLE INDEED!

At our Lord's Supper at Trinity we remember what is traditionally known as the "Last Supper." Held in the Upper Room, during the season of Passover, Jesus presides over the "Passover" meal which remembers what great work God had done in bringing the captives out of Egypt – setting the captives free!

During the meal, the four promises God makes in Exodus Chapter 6, are remembered:

"I will take you out,"
"I will free you,"
"I will redeem you,"
"I will take you to myself.

As each promise is remembered, they drink from the cup. This along with bitter herbs reminding them of the bitterness of captivity, and the unleavened (sinless) bread - make up the focus of the Passover meal. A fifth cup is present, traditionally known as the "Elijah" cup. It is placed there to remind of Elijah's return one day, when Elijah would determine the answers to some of the auestions that the people of Israel could not resolve - the Fifth Cup.

In the setting of the "Last Supper," Jesus puts new purpose into this meal in a very significant and specific way. When Jesus takes the unleavened ("sinless") bread, he

breaks it, and gives it to his friends – but then he says in effect, "This sinless bread – is my very body, which will be broken – For You! to the garden at Gethsemane. Once there, Jesus takes Peter, James, and John into the garden to pray. And it is here that we remember that



Then, we read in the Gospels that, after supper, Jesus took the cup again – perhaps at the time to remember God's promise of redemption (the third cup), and says. "This redemption we remember – well this redemption is now in my blood which will be shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sins. For in forgiveness between you and God, there lies redemption."

Well, at Trinity, when we celebrate the Lord's Supper, we also remember that after the supper, Jesus and the 11 move through the Kidron Valley to the aarden at Gethsemane. Once there. and John into the garden that we remember that he speaks to his heavenly Father, "Let this cup pass from me, vour will not mine be done." What Cup? Perhaps the Fifth Cup, the Elijah Cup, the cup of God's wrath written in scripture in Jeremiah 25 – which speaks of the cup of God's wrath which was to be poured out upon all nations.

As "Easter" people we know that in Jesus' death and resurrection Jesus drank that cup dry – for you! Not one drop left for those who are in Christ Jesus – That, now there is no condemnation for those who are in Him. Jesus came and "decided" the fate of that Fifth cup. He drank it dry, took the punishment and forgave us all the while he was doing so - "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing."

So this day, and every day of your life – stop believing the lies of the father of all lies. Believe, and live into the truth: The cup of condemnation has been replaced – by the cup of freedom, redemption, and reconciliation! Good News Indeed!

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
