You may be a PCA who needs a break out in the country, a healthy retiree looking for a place to stay, a college student studying from home or someone who reads this and it just feels right.
- Expectations are limited and include:
- Pericare/diapering
- Cleaning (Mom and her areas as well as your bedroom and light cleaning of common areas)
- Feeding (3 meals a day, many are made by Dad/Daughter)
- Helping get out of bed in morning and to bed at night
- Medications (twice a day at meal times)
- Assistance with Physical / Speech therapy
- Activities of daily living (bathing, hand washing, teeth brushing,)
- Ideally no job outside the house, though on weekends or days off
 or online work would be ok. At the moment online is 10mbs
- Keeping mom company and comfortable
- These expectation care times are busy but are within a set time frame in aroutine. Busiest times are 8-9, 1:30-2:30, 6-8:30. Compensation is negotiable and is in the form of:
- Room & board you'll have a bedroom and food supplied
- Country Living fresh air, lots of wild life, nearby hiking trails, camping, & fishing
- Scheduled day(s) off each week / available time off Mom is staying at our countryside home with Dad who does all the heavy lifting and most of the cooking. Although retired he continues to "work the farm" and stays busy outdoors all day. He is funny, sometimes sarcastic, and straightforward and will be very direct with you, hopefully you are similar. Currently Mom's oldest daughter is at the house during the week and her younger daughter is there some weekends. While we love this time with Mom, we look forward to welcoming you to our home.
